Early Closure on St Thomas More Day 26th June – parents should have received a letter via email informing them of the arrangements for St Thomas More Day which is celebrated on Friday 26th June. Our Feast Day Mass will take place in the morning, followed by house mini-sports (PE kits will be needed if your child is taking part in the mini-sports). **The celebrations will finish at approximately 1:20pm, after this time, students will be dismissed for an early finish.** To date, the school contract buses have informed us that they will be collecting the pupils at their usual departure time so we encourage you to make alternative arrangements for your child to travel home as the school site will be closing at 1:30pm. If hot weather is forecast, then we will contact parents to let them know if students are not required to wear a blazer to school. 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Matthew 10:26-38

This week we hear from the Holy Gospel according to St Matthew. In this Our Lord Jesus Christ addresses His Disciples but speaks to us all. He tells us that the truth of who we are as people, and the truth of the Gospel, cannot be hidden. He states that what we learnt in the 'dark' (in less crowded, private settings. Though prayer or teachings) must be proclaimed in the 'light' (publicly and for everyone to see).

Our Lord also talks about the very human instinct of fear. Fear of being unpopular, fear of being ridiculed, and for some people – the fear of death. What if this true self and our true message becomes the reason for rejection when we bring it into the light? Our Lord responds to all of these worries with 3 simple words: "Have no fear".

As a community dedicated to St Thomas More, we have a powerful model of what it looks like to live out the Gospel. Next Friday we will celebrate his feast day but the Church will celebrate him this coming Monday (22nd June). We will be celebrating a man who truly understood what our Lord Jesus Christ was saying in our reading this Sunday, Jesus gave comfort to those who would be martyred – do not fear those who kill the body for they cannot kill the soul – and St. Thomas More was killed for his faith.

St Thomas More lived in a time where there was a lot of pressure to conform. To stay quiet or agree with the powers of state, if he had he would've experienced a good life and have been well protected. He understood that the truth was more important than his status.

Throughout life we are all constantly forming ourselves into the people we are meant to be, it means that there is a lot of pressure from the outside telling us to believe in certain things or to subdue what makes us unique for the sake of just being part of the crowd. The pressure to blend in feels like it's at his highest when you're in school, you might not want to speak up when you see a friend doing something wrong, or speak publicly about your faith. Going with the crowd can feel like you have more friends. This Gospel this week reminds you that doing the difficult thing and siding with what is good and true is always the best option, even when its unpopular, and lets not forget about the reminder that we all have God-give value, and that we are known, loved, and numbered by the Father.

Be a person of the "light": don't wait for the right moment to stand up for good values, do it everyday. If you see a peer being mistreated, if you see a standard slipping, or if you see something that doesn't look right – remember the words of Christ and don't give into the temptation to be silent. Proclaim your integrity through your actions, just as St Thomas More did.

Chaplain's charity haircut: Last year our chaplain, Max, cut his hair into a tonsure (the bearded man is our chaplain with the haircut from last year) to raise money for the Special care baby unit at our local hospital. We listened to feedback from last year so this year the tonsure will be neater (as in the second reference picture) and there are more guaranteed opportunities for the wider community to see this haircut. **This haircut will start on 25/06/2026 and for every £100 raised,**

If we raise £400 Max will have the haircut while he addresses his local parish over the different Sunday Masses (likely around 500 - 600 people), if we raise £700 Max will have to keep the haircut for when he meets the bishop and representatives from catholic schools across the diocese for the annual leadership conference, and if we raise £1000 Max will keep the tonsure until the end of term (that's 21 days for the price of 10!). **All money raised goes to support the floating gardens initiative from CAFOD** – helping farmers in difficult climates to be able to cultivate food for themselves and their community with sustainable 'floating' gardens. 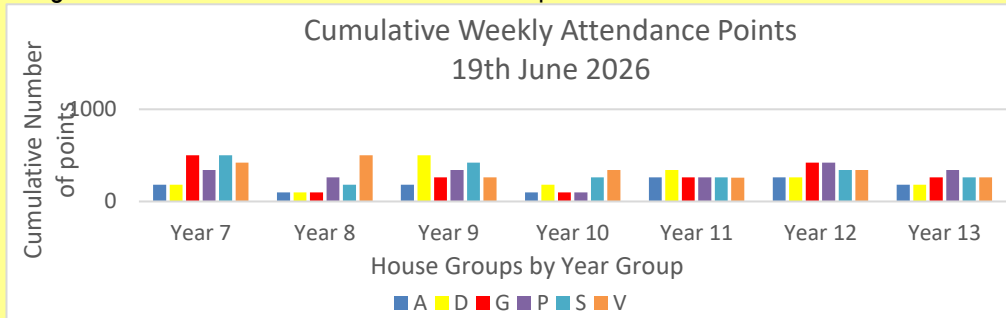

Absence: If your child is unwell and unable to attend, please notify the school of the reason for the absence on the first day of an unplanned absence by 9am or as soon as practically possible by calling the school and selecting attendance or by emailing attendance@st-thomasmore.southend.sch.uk If the absence lasts more than one day, please update the school daily. Attending a medical or dental appointment will be counted as authorised if the pupil's parent/carer notifies the school in advance of the appointment. We encourage parents/carers to make medical and dental appointments out of school hours where possible. Where this is not possible, the pupil should be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary. You can request a leave of absence for exceptional circumstances by through school gateway or alternatively email attendance@st-thomasmore.southend.sch.uk or by collecting a form from Reception. Please keep medical evidence of absence e.g.



appointment cards or letters, copies of prescriptions, pharmacy receipts etc in case you need them to provide more details on your child's return to school.

House Attendance Points: The form with the highest attendance in the year group gets 100 points each week and every form achieving 97% or above for the week achieves 20 points towards their house.



Student Medical Conditions: Please ensure school is made aware of any updates regarding students medical conditions, particularly if they can potentially have an impact on their time in school and require support. Brooklands Museum Trip - Friday, 12th June 2026: Last week, a group of 58 students enjoyed an exciting and educational trip to Brooklands Museum, accompanied by Mr Pereira, Mr Jackson, Dr Arnold, Mr Millham, Mrs Weir and Mr Burton. Throughout the day, students explored the fascinating world of aviation and engineering, including the opportunity to sit in the cockpits of several fighter aircraft. They took part in a guided Aeronautics Tour, learning about the pioneering achievements at Brooklands, the evolution of aircrafts in the 20th century, and the scientific principles behind flight, including aerodynamics, motion and forces. Students also attended the engaging *Supersonic Numbers* workshop, where they



discovered the work of Brooklands-based mathematician Joanna Weber, created and tested paper aeroplanes, and used Weber's innovative mathematics to calculate their aircrafts' maximum theoretical speeds. A highlight of the visit was the Concorde experience, where students enjoyed a walkthrough of the iconic supersonic airliner and learned about the engineering challenges involved in creating an aircraft capable of reaching Mach 2—twice the speed of sound. The trip provided a wonderful opportunity for students to see how engineers and



scientists have grappled with some of the biggest ideas in aviation history while bringing classroom learning to life. We would like to extend our sincere thanks to the volunteers at Brooklands Museum for providing such a fantastic day filled with fascinating information and memorable experiences.

Futbol Lingo - Tuesday, 16th June 2026: Students in Years 7 and 8, alongside GCSE Spanish students in Years 9 and 10, recently enjoyed an inspiring visit from Pierce Kiemi of Futbol Lingo. Speaking six languages and working for FIFA, Pierce delivered an engaging assembly on the importance of language learning and the opportunities it can create within the football industry. Students learned about a range of lesser-known careers in football that require language skills and discovered how many elite Premier League footballers speak more than one language, helping them thrive in the global game. Later in the day, students took part in a Copa América-themed workshop, where they worked in groups to use their Spanish skills to persuade others why their assigned South American country should host the next tournament. As part of the challenge, students created sentences about their country's traditional cuisine, famous footballers, population, key landmarks, and cultural significance. Some students also enjoyed a practical session on the school astro pitch, where they practised common Spanish football phrases such as “¡Pasa el balón!” (Pass the ball!) and “¡Tira!” (Shoot!) while taking part in friendly matches against their peers. This was a fantastic way to combine language learning with physical activity and demonstrate how languages can be used in real-life sporting situations. The day was a fantastic opportunity to combine language learning with a passion for football and to showcase the real-world value of speaking another language.

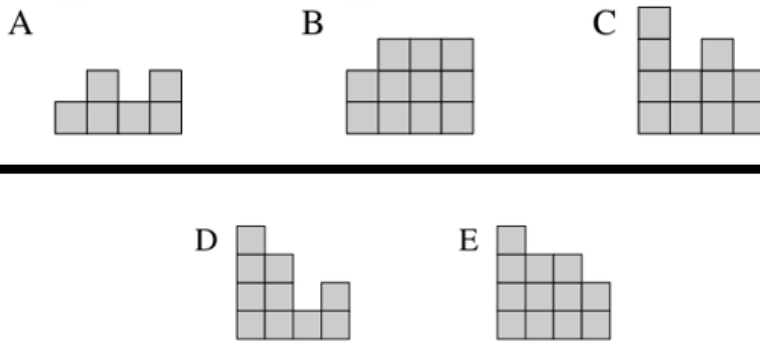
